In Hawaii, May Day, which is on May 1st, is celebrated as Lei Day. It's a statewide celebration honoring Hawaiian culture, especially the art of lei making. Lei Day is a day to exchange and receive leis, which are garlands of flowers and other natural materials, symbolizing affection, greeting, and the spirit of "Aloha".

Lei Day began in 1928 to recognize the art and meaning behind lei making. The day includes lei contests, hula performances, and various cultural activities.





Mahalo to our mothers on Mother's Day!!!

Mother's Day in the United States is celebrated on the second Sunday of May, with traditions including giving gifts, sending cards, and family dinners. The holiday's origins trace back to Anna Jarvis, who initiated the first formal celebrations in West Virginia and Pennsylvania in 1908. Her goal was to honor her mother, Ann Jarvis, who had died the previous year and dedicated her life to serving others, including soldiers during the Civil War. Anna Jarvis pushed for a national holiday, which President Woodrow Wilson officially declared in 1914.



Memorial Day observed the last Monday of May. The holiday's origins can be traced back to the aftermath of the Civil War, with the first national observance taking place on May 30, 1868. At that time, it was known as Decoration Day, and the primary focus was on decorating the graves of fallen soldiers with flowers. Today, the holiday honors all military personnel who died in service.

-The Deborah Sampson Act, addressing healthcare barriers for women veterans.

-Removal of the 12-year limit on using Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) benefits.
