WE REMEMBER: THE LEGACY OF 9/11 AND ITS IMPACT ON VETERANS



On the morning of September 11, 2001, America changed forever. Terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center in New York, the Pentagon, and Flight 93, which crashed in Pennsylvania, left the nation in shock. Nearly 3,000 lives were lost that day, but the ramifications went far beyond the immediate tragedy. The attacks set off a chain of events leading to the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq, known collectively as the Global War on Terror.

In the aftermath of 9/11, the U.S. military embarked on its longest-running conflict. Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, which began in October 2001, followed by Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003. These wars, spanning over two decades, claimed the lives of more than 7,000 U.S. service members and left tens of thousands more physically and mentally wounded.

According to the Department of Defense, approximately 2,461 American soldiers were killed in Afghanistan and over 4,500 in Iraq.

HAWAII'S ROLE IN THE GLOBAL WAR ON TERROR

For Hawaii, the impact of 9/11 was deeply felt, both by the local community and through its military presence. Hawaii's National Guard and Reserve units were repeatedly activated and deployed during these wars. For example, Hawaii's Army National Guard and 29th Infantry Brigade Combat Team served multiple tours in the Middle East. Families across the islands saw their loved ones answer the call to duty, often enduring multiple deployments that stretched over several years.

Today, the VFW Department of Hawaii honors those who served in these conflicts, including the growing number of post-9/11 veterans eligible for membership. These veterans, many of whom are younger and include a significant number of women, represent a new wave of VFW members. They bring with them unique experiences shaped by combat, repeated deployments, and the challenges of transitioning back to civilian life. The wars in Iraq, Afghanistan, and Kuwait have created a new generation of veterans who deserve recognition and support.

THE BATTLE CONTINUES AT HOME: PTSD AND SUICIDE

The warzone may be thousands of miles away, but for many veterans, the battle doesn't end upon returning home. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and mental health challenges are common among veterans who served in Iraq, Afghanistan, and Kuwait. Studies have shown that repeated deployments significantly increase the likelihood of PTSD, anxety, and depression. Along with spiked in PTSD and other disorders, the suicide rate among veterans is tragically high, with the Department of Veterans Affairs estimating that an average of 17 veterans die by suicide each day. Veterans who served in the Middle East face significant mental health challenges, with over 30,000 veteran suicides reported since 9/11.

A CALL TO ACTION: THE VFW'S ROLE IN SUPPORTING VETERANS

The VFW is uniquely positioned to support these veterans. However, as older generations of veterans pass away, the organization must adapt. Recruiting younger veterans, including women, is crucial for the VFW's future. These veterans bring diverse experiences that will shape the VFW's evolution. The VFW Department of Hawaii, in particular, must embrace this change, reaching out to post-9/11 veterans to ensure they have the support they need.

ADDRESSING TOXIC EXPOSURES: THE PACT ACT

In addition to mental health challenges, many veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan were exposed to toxic substances, such as burn pits. The PACT Act, signed into law in 2022, expands VA healthcare and benefits for veterans affected by toxic exposures during their service. This includes veterans who served in Southwest Asia and Afghanistan after 9/11. The law allows these veterans to access medical care and benefits without having to prove their conditions are service-related, providing much-needed relief to those suffering from respiratory issues, cancers, and other long-term health effects.

MOVING FORWARD TOGETHER

As we reflect on the legacy of 9/11, we honor not only those lost in the attacks but also the veterans who fought in the wars that followed. The VFW must continue to evolve, offering vital support to the next generation of veterans, ensuring that their service and sacrifices are never forgotten.

By embracing these new members, the VFW will remain a critical lifeline for veterans—offering camaraderie, advocacy, and support long after the guns fall silent. We will never forget the heroes of 9/11 and the wars that followed, and we will continue to fight for those who fought for us.



(Maunawili, HI, 14 Sep 2024) — Comrades and spouses from Post 10276 gathered on Saturday, 14 September, from 0700-1400 hrs, to stage the Post 10276 Garage Sale, at the home of Post Adjutant Patsy Takemura, deep in the heart of Maunawili.

"This was a huge undertaking spanning two days. We could not have pulled this off with outstanding results, without the help of all our volunteers who showed up to help," said Post QM, Clyde Yoshimura.

Yoshimura and his wife, Arlene, came to Patsy's home the night before, with about 20 other volunteers, to set up tents and merchandise display tables. They also organized, sorted, categorized and priced all the donated goods from other Post comrades.

"We had a lot of good stuff," said garage sale organizer, Patsy Takemura. "We had a lot of kitchen appliances, still in the original box, unopened, and a lot of nice unused clothing with the price labels still attached," Takemura added.

The garage sale also provided a great fellowship event. Virtually everyone brought food for a Friday night dinner potluck, Saturday morning breakfast, and Saturday lunch.

"We had 'choke food' (lots of food) and lots of chance to catch up and meet other new Post members," said Post comrade, Herman Encarnacion.

All the hard work paid off. The Post netted more than \$1,300. Takemura said, "All profits will go to fund our door prize lucky numbers at our Post Christmas party on 21 Dec".

VFW POST 10276 GETTING TO KNOW THE NEW AKAKA CLINIC

((Kapolei, HI, Sep 20, 2024) — Post 10276 Comrades, spouses, family members and caregivers took an orientation tour of the new Daniel Kahikina Akaka Veterans Clinic in Kapolei, on Friday, 20 September, from 1200-1330 hours.

"The whole purpose of having our tour was to make the clinic more welcoming, familiar and inviting, especially for our first-time patients, their family members and caregivers," said Ray Loo, Post 10276 VSO (Veterans Service Officer), and tour organizer. "It is ultimately a family member or caregiver that brings their family veteran to his/her appointments at the clinic," Loo added.

The impressive and imposing Akaka Clinic with its tall ceilings and airy open spaces, opened on April 4, 2024; was completed on time and on budget at a cost of \$130 million, and occupies more than 88,000 square feet behind the Kapolei Costco. Akaka Clinic host and tour guide, was JARRIN AKINA, Clinic Business Manager.

"Since its opening on April 4th, four-and-a-half months ago, the clinic is still growing to attain its authorized staffing and all the clinical services it will eventually offer," said Akina. "Currently the clinic serves more than 16,000 veterans from the Waianae west coast, leeward and central Oahu."

"The Clinic currently offers primary care and specialty services, laboratory services, a pharmacy, imaging services, eyecare, physical therapy, audiology, mental health services, a variety of therapies to cope with PTSD, a prosthetics clinic, the 'Brew Cafe' with coffee, beverages and light snacks, women's health care, 'rapid-action' capability for walk-ins, and so much more," Akina said. "Coming soon, MRI imaging, a dental clinic, and urgent care."

Arriving at the Akaka Clinic one immediately realizes they did not compete with morning traffic to get to the Clinic, they did not have to worry about having the right 'ID' to access the Clinic, and there was lots of parking.

"The Akaka Clinic boasts 528 parking spaces; 43 reserved for handicapped veterans, and 19 with electrical charging stations," Akina said. "In the future, a valet service is being planned in addition to courtesy shuttles that will pick up from nearby neighborhoods."

"The Veteran Transportation Service (VTS) will pick up eligible veterans from their homes and bring them to their appointments at the Clinic," Akina said. A Veterans Benefits Office is located in the left side of the Clinic building. Veterans can check on the status of their claims when arriving for care.

The West Oahu Vet Center is expected to relocate to the Akaka Clinic by the end of the year. The VFW liaison office is located next to the pharmacy. There are a lot comfortable, spacious sitting and waiting areas, with cushy sofas and chairs, to complement its high, cathedral-like ceiling and expansive open areas. It's a great place to relax, enjoy a beverage, socialize and 'talk story.'

After the tour, the group returned to their meeting room to enjoy sandwiches, fruits and light snacks provided by the Akaka Clinic Community Outreach Office. While enjoying their snacks the group learned about the Akaka Clinic food distribution programs and other initiatives the Akaka Clinic supports and sponsors.

A big mahalo to AL DOMINGO, from the Akaka Clinic Outreach Office (and a Post 10276 Comrade) for our refreshments at the end of our tour.

When asked his opinion about the tour, Post Comrade DENNIS SEKINE said; "This clinic is a game changer for all veterans here in Hawaii and throughout the Pacific basin which the Akaka Clinic serves." "It is very easy to get here, and all veterans should consider transferring their health care to this Clinic."

Spouses SHARYN SEKINE, GAYLE SUGAI and Post Comrade MADELINE BALLESTEROS, checked out the restrooms. They reported the restrooms were "Spacious, clean, well maintained, and stocked with free women's feminine products."

Finally, as Post 10276 members left the Clinic, walking back to their cars, Post QM, CLYDE YOSHIMURA stopped, and looked back. A couple of seconds later he said, "If the Akaka Clinic had beds and a surgical suite, this would be a 'full-on' hospital!"

 - -Removal of the 12-year limit on using Veteran Readiness and Employment (VR&E) benefits.
